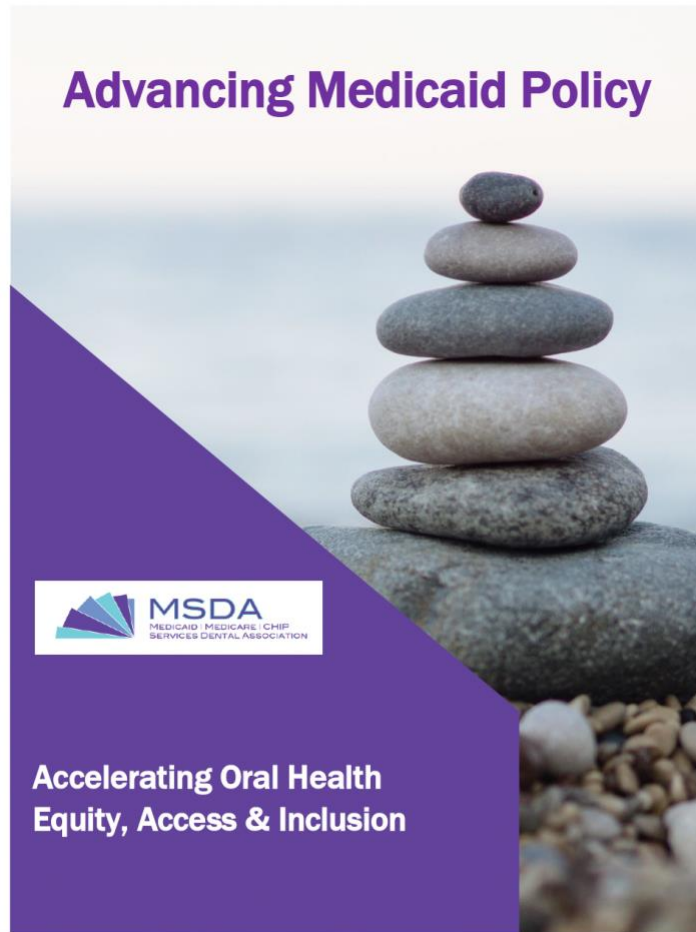

General Information

History

The Medicaid|Medicare|CHIP Services Dental Association (MSDA) was founded in May of 2004, in Los Angeles, California at a meeting for state Medicaid dental program representatives. Attendees, consisting primarily of representatives from the state Medicaid and State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) dental programs, voted to form an association that would advocate for the delivery of oral health care to the Medicaid and SCHIP eligible populations. MSDA was established as a Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation, 501(c)(3), in October of the same year, as the Medicaid/SCHIP Dental Program Representatives Association. The organization operates today as the Medicaid|Medicare|CHIP Services Dental Association with 172 primary and affiliate state members representing all fifty state Medicaid and CHIP dental programs plus the District of Columbia. In FY 2022, the MSDA Associate membership decreased to 20 individual members, as many joined the MSDA Corporate Round Table. In FY 2022, the MSDA Corporate Round Table was made up of 23 member organizations with 87 affiliates. This group represents a new constituency of partners working in Medicaid and Medicare Advantage dental programs contracting and supporting government administrators, programs, and services. MSDA was registered as a domestic non-profit 501c3 corporation in California, and now maintains offices in Washington DC, Alexandria, VA, California, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island.

Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic

In early 2020, a National Public Health State of Emergency was declared when the COVID-19 Pandemic emerged. During that time, dental offices shuttered, and dental care was limited to the delivery of essential services only. New policies were generated daily as federal and state legislation was passed to ensure all Americans had access to affordable healthcare.

Due to the unprecedented disruption caused by the pandemic, state administrators became overwhelmed by new regulations along with surges in Medicaid enrollment and demand for care.

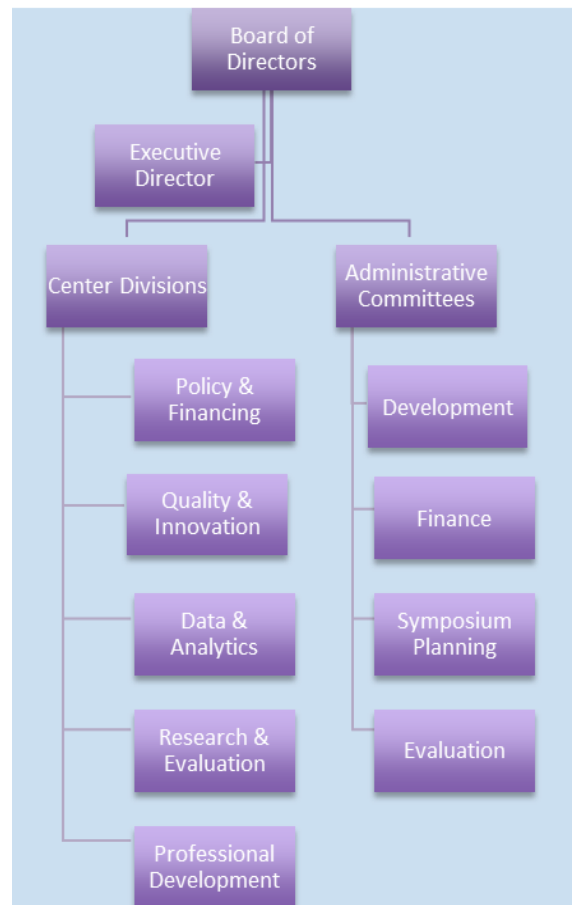
During that time, MSDA took on a leadership role assisting state and corporate members by monitoring and interpreting federal legislation and regulation daily and translating it into relevant information so that states and health plans could better understand the policy implications for their dental programs. MSDA also provided technical assistance to state and Round Table Members via *Coffee Hours* and national webinars.

Strategic Plan

Since its inception MSDA has expanded in scope, breadth, and membership. The organization has key staff, which provides the capacity to manage the day-to-day operations. The administrative committees and a Center for Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health Program Quality, Policy and Financing provide the infrastructure for conducting the business of the organization.

Since the start of the pandemic, MSDA's growth continues as state, Corporate Round Table, and associate members learn the value of our unique public-private-organizational partnership. As new issues have emerged in this ever-changing healthcare environment, so too have opportunities to work together to find solutions.

A new Strategic Plan for FY2023 and beyond has been developed. This new plan builds on past accomplishments and poises MSDA to be ready for organizational opportunities that will accelerate its Vision and Mission, while strengthening partnerships and growth potential.



MSDA Board Retreat

On September 23rd, 2022, the Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP Services Dental Association (MSDA) Board of Directors convened a Strategic Planning Retreat in Des Moines, IA. The meeting took place at the Delta Dental of Iowa Headquarters. The purpose of the retreat was to assess the outcomes and impact of MSDA's 2015-2018 Strategic Plan, and to develop a strategic initiative focusing on current priorities as well as the future growth and development of the organization's members and Board senior staff met to review the FY 2020 Annual Report which included all operations, finances, development, membership, and programs. Meeting minutes from the Board Retreat detail the Board's deliberations.¹

FY 2023 Vision

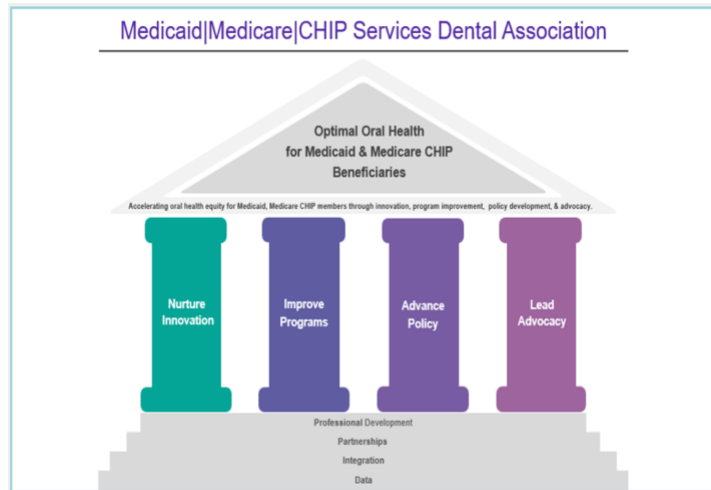
Optimal Oral Health for Medicaid, Medicare, and Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Beneficiaries.

FY 2022 Financial Information

Contractual obligations supported the development and maintenance of the MSDA website and National Profile, legal assistance, accounting services, data support services, and administrative support.

Center Division Reports

MSDA's Center for Quality, Policy, and Financing implemented the organization's projects, retaining MSDA's position as a national leader in advancing Medicaid, Medicare, and CHIP oral health policy and programs across the US. The following report briefly summarizes the activities undertaken in FY 2022.

1. DIVISION OF POLICY AND FINANCING

Goal: The goal of the Division of Policy and Financing is to facilitate the development of sound policy that supports quality driven, cost-effective oral healthcare delivery and administration. Objectives include establishing an oral health services financing research agenda and to promote healthcare financing policies for Medicaid and CHIP programs that align with the scientific evidence.

National Medicaid Oral Health Policy Academy for Adults with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) - Phases 1 and 2—In collaboration with the Delta Dental Foundation and Delta Dental Foundation of Arkansas, MSDA implemented a policy initiative aimed at increasing access to dental/oral healthcare services for Medicaid-covered adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD).

Phase 1 of the Collaborative demonstrated how a state waiver could advance a specialized dental benefit for a portion of the adult population, namely the community based I/DD population, who present with higher disease risk and greater needs; and could serve as a first step for legislators—approve and funding a benefit for a smaller segment of the Medicaid adult population.

In Phase 1, MSDA convened a six-state I/DD Oral Health Policy Academy that 1) researched Medicaid law; 2) identified the legal authority under which a unique dental program for I/DD adults may be developed; 3) designed and developed an I/DD Adult Medicaid Dental Policy Tool Kit; and 4) developed a state specific fiscally viable dental benefit for adults with I/DD. Phase 1 began in July 2021 and ended in June 2022. Both the resulting Tool Kit and a Phase 1 White Paper

can be found under *Resources* at www.medicaidental.org.

Phase 2, which continues into FY 2023 with five of the original state teams, began in July 2022. This phase builds upon the State models developed in Phase 1, and transforms them into value-based models of oral healthcare for Medicaid-covered adults with I/DD. For the purposes of Phase 2, success and effectiveness will be measured by:

- a. Development of Value-Based Models for use with Medicaid I/DD Dental Programs
- b. Development of an I/DD Value-Based Care Adult Medicaid Policy Tool-Kit
- c. Publication of an I/DD Medicaid Policy and Value-Based Care Model *Best Practices White Paper*
- d. Spread of the I/DD Medicaid Policy and Value-Based Care Model to other Medicaid programs

Teledentistry Policy—In FY 2022, MSDA continued to track the progress of Teledentistry policy development at the state level. Although teledentistry is incorporated into policy among some Medicaid agencies, not all state programs have such policies in place. In addition, few were wholly prepared for the demand for telehealth services that the COVID-19 pandemic brought on. To alleviate some of the access issues that emerged during the pandemic, MSDA offered guidance from national and federal authorities as well as experts in the field to inform rapid policymaking around the development, financing, and administration of teledentistry services.

Technical Assistance (TA)—Throughout FY 2022, staff from the Division of Policy and Financing provided technical assistance and education services to a variety of members and clients. Topics included Medicaid and CHIP legislation; regulation and policy; benefit design; payment structures; reimbursement rates; financing/budgeting; performance measurement; value-based purchasing; innovative program administration; and general program management-related services. Stakeholders and clients included federal and state agencies, health plans, clinical providers, educators professional and other national organizations and Medicaid payers.

Highlights of MSDA’s Technical Assistance Work include:

- a. Benefit design, financing and budgetary activities, data and analytics, program administration, and evaluation.
- b. MSDA provided an unprecedented amount of technical assistance to state leaders due to the programmatic challenges that the COVID-19 pandemic brought to federal, state, and local governments.
- c. MSDA provided technical assistance to the American Dental Association (ADA), American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry (AAPD), National Academy of State Health Policy (NASHP), Association of State and Territorial Dental Directors (ASTDD), Oral Health America; the Dental Quality Alliance (DQA), Delta Dental of IA, Delta Dental Foundation of IN, MI and OH; the Kaiser Family Foundation; MCNA, Western University of Health Sciences Dental School; Health Resources and Services Administration; CMS, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and other university-based dental professionals.
- d. During FY 2022, MSDA staff provided technical assistance and training to third-party contractors regarding Medicaid policy and programming. Overall, MSDA provided clients with industry knowledge necessary to inform future corporate decisions and strategies.

2. DIVISION OF QUALITY AND INNOVATION

Goal: The goal of the Division of Quality and Innovation is to develop and promote innovative evidence-based Medicaid and Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP) oral health policies and practices through collaboration with a broad spectrum of stakeholders. MSDA works with partners to develop and test models that demonstrate improvement in program quality, processes, and services.

The Center communicates frequently with its members and stakeholders and invites submissions of program policies, practices and/or initiatives from government programs as well as educators, researchers, payers, providers, funders, and advocates that demonstrate these types of improvements.

Medicaid Dental Program Artificial Intelligence Learning and Action Collaborative— In July 2022, MSDA launched the first-ever national Medicaid Artificial Intelligence (AI) dental program initiative, introducing as its inaugural partner Overjet, a dental Artificial Intelligence (AI) leader. Aiming to advance quality, policy, and efficiency through innovative AI strategies, MSDA designed and implemented the *Learning and Action Collaborative* with the goals of improving operational cost-effectiveness resulting in improved beneficiary oral healthcare. MSDA’s year-long collaboration with Overjet establishes the first-ever foundational learning framework and curricula for the use of AI in Medicaid dental program administration. The eighteen participating state team learn how the use of AI will increase efficiency, especially in claims processing, and will improve payment integrity. Moving forward in 2023, state teams have the option of participating in an AI pilot that will enhance learning using actual state data.

Dental Quality Alliance (DQA)—The Dental Quality Alliance is charged with the development of standardized dental quality measures for use in dentistry. Since 2009, MSDA has participated as either a steering committee member or as a public observer. MSDA continues to offer technical assistance around use of the DQA measures by State Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health Programs and their vendors. Since its inception, MSDA has played a significant role in identifying subject matter experts to educate and provide technical assistance to members of the DQA for the development of reliable dental quality measures for the profession.

MSDA Corporate Roundtable—At the cornerstone of MSDA’s Corporate Roundtable is an investment in activities to support and advance the quality of State Medicaid and CHIP Dental Programs through contractor engagement. In December 2021, the Roundtable’s fall meeting was convened in Washington, DC as a combined meeting to promote MSDA’s work with the I/DD Initiatives and to discuss how collaboration could help to strengthen the initiative. Corporate partners joined MSDA Board members and several state program leaders to engage in an open and candid discussion about the challenges that adults with I/DD have in accessing quality, timely and appropriate dental care, current political environment, and its impact on Medicaid dental programs,

A Focus on Oral Health Equity—Understanding that one of the CMS Priority Pillars in Medicaid Programs is Health Equity, MSDA has also placed a particular focus on health equity in Medicaid policy development and maintenance. As such, the 2021-2022 MSDA Symposium, titled *“Advancing Oral Health Equity through Inclusion, Access, Accountability, and Artificial Intelligence”* shed a light on Medicaid dental policy through an equity lens. The two-day virtual event explored relevant topics such as: *“Focusing on Equity in Oral Healthcare—Why Now and How?”*, *“Understanding the Problems”*, *“Identifying Solutions: Inclusion and Access”*, *“Assessing Quality and Equity in Medicaid Programs & Oral Healthcare”*, *“Gaining Input through a Member Self-Assessment”*, and *“Employing Digital Technology and Artificial Intelligence (AI) to Promote Oral Health Equity”*.

MSDA has also included the importance of health equity in all of the 2021 and 2022 Learning Collaboratives which it conducts and has included it as a pillar in its own updated Strategic Plan, as developed by the Board of Directors in September 2022.

3. DIVISION OF DATA AND ANALYTICS

Goals: The goals of the Division of Data and Analytics are to: 1) promote the use of data for the advancement of oral health policy, and access to care by federal and state Medicaid programs; 2) identify and/or establish and maintain relevant topics and sources of data that are most useful to MSDA members and stakeholders; and 3) work with other organizations to improve data, information systems; standardization; and use of data

COVID-19-Related Surveys—To meet the growing demand for timely, accurate information throughout most of 2021, MSDA developed and conducted surveys aimed at gathering and reporting critical programmatic information and data. The following are examples of the survey topics, which were directed at State Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health Program Administrators to help monitor national Medicaid policy, programs, and services:

- a. Payment of PPE and/or infection control costs to dentists,
- b. Teledentistry policy around CDT Codes D9995 (Synchronous) and D9996 (Asynchronous),

- c. COVID's effect on State's Medicaid dental provider network,
- d. FDA Guidance on the use of Amalgam Restorations and the effect on Medicaid dental benefits.

The information received from State leaders was analyzed and broadly distributed. From this, most states advanced their policies to support the safe and effective rendering of dental care.

MSDA National Survey and Profile of State Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health Programs—The Division of Data and Analytics is responsible for the collection, assessment and publishing of state, regional and national Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health program information and data. Current national, regional, and state data, as well as archived data, is available on a user-friendly online platform that has the capacity for comparative analysis of state and regional data. The National Profile may be accessed free of charge to registered users at www.msdanationalprofile.com. This website also supports links to state data files and specialized reports. MSDA continues to receive requests to use the data for various publications. After the release of the redesigned online platform, MSDA's National Survey was distributed to states in March 2020. States were asked to submit 2019 program data. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the disruption it caused nationwide, many states were unable to submit data. MSDA worked intensively with state administrators to collect the most critical information and data, deemed most relevant to policy makers. MSDA re-worked the original dissemination plan to allow for a phased release of the MSDA National Profile, starting with the "General", "Benefits" and "Policy" sections, then, releasing the "Management" Section and finally the "Administrative" Section. In addition, MSDA integrated federal EPSDT Program reports into the published online Profile.

National and State Medicaid Profile Reports—MSDA staff began a technical learning process to learn the Tableau platform in preparation for the development of data reports using the MSDA national profile. A projected start date of January 2023 is planned. MSDA continued to provide technical assistance and respond to requests for specialized national, regional and state reports. In FY 2022, MSDA continued to develop various specialized reports for state leaders and federal

partners as well as other key stakeholder organizations.

4. DIVISION OF RESEARCH AND EVALUATION

Goals: The goals of the Division of Research and Evaluation are to: 1) advance the science base that supports Medicaid and CHIP oral health delivery systems; 2) establish an oral health services financing research agenda; and 3) identify and test healthcare financing policies and dental benefit structures that align with the scientific evidence.

National Council on Disability: In 2022, MSDA contracted with the National Council on Disability (NCD) to undertake a study of oral health care (OHC) providers willingness to treat people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD). The six-month project involved a national study of OHC providers from across the states. MSDA surveyed OHC providers to learn why they participate or not in government programs that provide dental coverage for people with I/DD; and if not, what policy or program changes would incentivize them to participate. MSDA partnered with the American Academy of Developmental Medicine and the Special Care Dentistry Association to design and implement the project. New Jersey, New Hampshire and North Carolina Medicaid Dental Programs, along with several of MSDA’s Corporate Round Table Members assisted with the dissemination of the survey. In late September 2022, a full report was submitted to the NCD. The report includes key recommendations to Congress and the Department of Health and Human Services on policy changes for consideration that could yield better care, better outcomes at lower costs for adults with I/DD.

Centers for Inclusivity—In collaboration with the Delta Dental Foundation of Indiana, Michigan and Ohio, MSDA designed, developed, and implemented a multi-state, quality improvement demonstration project for Federally Qualified Health Centers aimed at increasing access to dental/oral healthcare services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). This eighteen-month project, which began in June 2022 targeted health center staff across Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana. MSDA provided oversight and guidance to dental directors focusing on three main objectives: expanding clinic infrastructure to better deliver care to patients with I/DD; building capacity through training at the University of Pennsylvania and New York

University Special Training Programs for Dentists; and finally increasing the number of people with I/DD receiving dental care services in the health centers. MSDA convened the dental directors and staff and met monthly with them to offer guidance and technical assistance. At the development of this report, the program remains ongoing with an anticipated end date around the summer of 2023. A plan to spread the project learnings nationally is included.

Orange County Local Oral Health Program (LOHP)— In January 2020, MSDA was awarded a three-year contract with the Orange County Health Care Agency, Local Oral Health Program. The contract includes tasks with a goal of supporting the LOHP meet program state and county goals and objectives. In FY 2022, MSDA provided technical assistance for the design, development, implementation, and evaluation of the Orange County LOHP Oral Health Plan, which aligns with the State of California’s Office of Oral Health, Oral Health Objectives. In addition, MSDA completed a thorough five-year Orange County LOHP project evaluation report that was required by the California Office of Oral Health. MSDA was also responsible for re-designing and implementing the LOHP’s Evaluation Plan and leads LOHP’s current effort to develop a new five-year strategic plan. MSDA has been able to complete its scope of work, despite the disruption caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. This long-term evaluation opportunity enhances MSDA’s ability to offer its expertise and technical assistance to other government programs in the future.

Evaluation Committee—The purpose of the MSDA Evaluation Committee, as assigned by the MSDA Board is to objectively assess and publicly respond to any applicable publications, reports, and data releases etc. that may impact Medicaid dental. Documents published by external sources, undergo critical objective review by the MSDA Evaluation Committee and are disseminated to relevant sources for discussion and reflection. In FY2022, MSDA’s Evaluation Committee did not undertake any critical assessments.

5. DIVISION OF PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Goals: The goals of the Division of Professional Development are to 1) increase knowledge and skill among state Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health program administrators and staff; and 2) build

infrastructure and capacity of state Medicaid and CHIP Oral Health programs.

MSDA-Sponsored Educational Events—The Division of Professional Development designs and implements professional development events for members and other constituency groups on issues affecting Medicaid stakeholders. In 2021, MSDA conducted several national webinars on emerging issues. These included: *HIPAA Regulation Updates*; *Non-Aerosol Dentistry*; *Teledentistry*; *Personal Protective Equipment and Advance Infection Control*. In addition, consistent communication with Members continued via email and Coffee Hours. While some COVID-19 restrictions still prevailed in 2021 and 2022, the MSDA Annual Symposium, generally held in-person during the month of June, was held virtually in January 2022. Ongoing Communication—MSDA convenes informal *Coffee Hours* regularly with State Medicaid Dental Program administrators. The purpose of the casual meetings is to share ideas, gain input, and assist in finding policy and program solutions to a variety of current issues facing State members. This member engagement proves to be a value-added service, as evidenced by the participant rate (70%+) at each event. In preparing for these events, MSDA remains focused on current, relevant and/or emerging issues to best support member needs. In the Spring 2022, a special *Coffee Hour* series was held with federal, state and round table members that gathered input in preparation for the Board of Director’s strategic planning session.

MSDA Listservs – In FY2022 both the MSDA State Member-only and a MSDA Public list-serves maintained consistent communication among and between MSDA members and the broader Medicaid stakeholder communities. The list-serves were established for use by MSDA State, Round Table and Associate Members as well as members of the public interested in posting questions to colleagues, responding to questions, and/or contributing to dialogue related to Medicaid, Medicare, and CHIP dental policy, programs, and services. The intent is for questions posted on the list-serves to be limited to requests for information not available on the MSDA National Profile. Listserv posts are quite regular and feedback from users continues to be positive, with users finding the forum timely, relevant, and useful in their professional lives.

MSDA Website- - The MSDA Website at www.medicaidental.org continues to be the cornerstone for accessing the relevant resources and timely information the organization has to offer.

The CMS Oral Health Technical Advisory Group (OTAG)—In FY 2022, Division staff continued involvement with CMS’s Oral Health Technical Advisory Group (OTAG). MSDA’s Executive Director, Mary Foley continued to provide regular MSDA updates during the monthly meetings. As the face of the OTAG changes over time, MSDA staff continues to provide support and input around nominations for new representatives, topic development, meeting preparation and regular communication to the OTAG participants.

Technical Assistance—Throughout FY 2022, Division staff provided ongoing technical support to State administrators in key areas regarding modifications to federal and state regulations, and program administration. Specifically, MSDA provided technical assistance to State administrators regarding teledentistry, PPE, and non-aerosol dental services. Other topics not related to pandemic included the Social Determinants of Health, value-based purchasing and payments, and quality/performance measurement.

Administrative Committee Reports

1. PLANNING COMMITTEE

In the 2022, the MSDA National Medicaid, Medicare, and CHIP Oral Health Symposium took place virtually. The title of the Symposium was *Advancing Oral Health Equity through Inclusion, Access, Accountability, and Artificial Intelligence*. The meeting provided an opportunity for participants to learn more about the access and network adequacy issues affecting states and how some are moving toward value-based programming. 2. DEVELOPMENT AND MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

MSDA is the *premier* national membership organization representing all *State* Medicaid and CHIP dental program administrators and their representatives. In 2014, MSDA recognized that the landscape of state program administration was changing, with a significant number of states moving to managed care. In response, MSDA established a new category of membership to become more inclusive. This category is called the *Group Member or MSDA Corporate Round Table*. corporations, organizations, and institutions that have an interest in Medicaid dental policy, programs or services are invited to join. At the December 2021 Annual Business Meeting, MSDA membership and dues structure now include:
